

The proposed site is two previously demolished city blocks with a parking garage left in tact. The location was chosen not only because it is ready for construction on non-green fand, but also because it sits on multiple major bus routes. In addition, there is a shopping complex currently under construction, which will be accessible by foot when completed.

The facility will be built in an L-shape, with the resident rooms on the north and south outer locations. Because of strong winds from the Rocky Mountain Range to the west, cross winds can be utilized for summer cooling of the facilities. Gardens will be built on the rooftop, as well as retrofitted to the existing parking garage not only for cafeteria use, but also to reduce rooftop owrming.

Project Research

Senior housing is much more needed today than ever. Not only do we have the baby boomer era heading to retirement communities shortly, but we have gotten quite far away from a society that takes care of our family and elderly- we now stick them in homes because we have too many things going on in our own life than to care for our community. We also need to be concerned with upcoming issues with retirement, pension and government-funded programs that are supposed to be in place to take care of us when we retire, but are quickly running out of money. This issue means that far more people have far less money to be used in retirement, and can typically not afford the fancy luxury-style retirement living.

For this project, it was necessary to research design for memory impaired residents. Te begin, a 'racetrack' layout is the most functional design because they quite often tend to wander, and keeping a circular layout prevents them from wandering off into areas the become unfamiliar or disorienting. Adding shadow boxes next to resident doors filled with mementos that resident would recognize as their own will aide in triggering their memory to their own room. It is important to use objects and materials as they are helps ward off confusion, for example, if wanting a wood floor than the best option is to use wood because a wood tile would confuse someone who is trying to make sense of a world that no longer makes sense. Color is also an imperative tool when considering design for the memory loss resident. Keeping doors that should not be used, painted the same color as the wall is a great technique in making the door blend into the wall. Dark flooring can feel like a hole and should be avoided as to not add an additional sense of vulnerability

When designing for the elderly, it is also necessary to keep in mind physical changes the residents are going through. Most elderly people have failing eyesight, so it is important to be very careful where furniture is placed as well as using color and items as markers to help navigate the layout when it is already hard to see. As mentioned above, many people have failing memory loss and this needs to be kept in mind at every aspect of the design process. Many people also have decreased body function, which means making sure the layout is easy for someone to get around whether they're walking, using the aide of a cane or in a wheelchair.

- Remove entire row of top 5" pull-out drawers to slightly lower counter top to make it easier to use both with a wheelchair and for reduced height of elderly.
- Upgrade microwave to convection microwave to accommodate only having stove top.
- 5. Lower cabinet height accordingly to keep standard 18" from counter-top to wall cabinet to keep ergonomically correct standards for reaching wall cabinets.





Kitchen Modifications for ADA Access





Specific base cabinets will be used that can be modified to remove the top 5" drawer, and still fit a stove top and sink in the second drawer. A slanted panel will cover the drain and disposal units so that the legs and wheelchair do not interfere with one another. Doors will still be in place to cover the openings when not in use, or for residents not needing these accommodations.

Bathroom Modifications for ADA Access

- Swing out door to make it easier to get in and out of the bathing area without the need to step over the tub.
- 2. Chair for seating when taking a shower
- 3. Handrails along all three sides of enclosure making it easier to get up/down/in/out of the small space.
- 4. Removable shower spout to use when it is easier to sit and shower, or for when aide is needed in bathing.



Universal Design

Elements of design are key to keeping your work creative. The elements I used most in my design are texture and shape. Texture really is the one that stands out most for me. There are a lot of parameters we need to stick within when designing for the elderly, and texture is one of the design elements we can most readily use without adding too much confusion, introducing elements that may cause harm to aging residents while still keeping the design fresh.

I included a rock and plant water wall/feature when you first enter the lobby. The various textures of water, plants and wood will help to stimulate the memory of waterfalls while hiking in the Rockys. I wanted to keep the community room feeling like a mountain lodge but update it so it was clean and modern - I used wooden beams (non-structural) to a textural interest on the ceiling, marble ledgestone on the base of the fireplace with smooth large-format tile panels on the remainder of the floor-to-ceiling fireplace. The exercise room will you a recycled tire composite for the flooring to be a great base for exercising, but to also replicate pebbles on the hiking trails.

The other major element I incorporated was line/shape. I want the design to feel clean, fresh and modern. Even if the design is styled after a mountain lodge resort, I didn't want it to feel to rustic. Using clean materials without a lot of color puts emphasis on the large-scaled shape of the design without getting confused in the details. By using organic materials (and keeping the colors true to their original form), I can give the design an updated feel based on a rustic, natural design.
